Great Lakes Governors, and Lawmakers Push for Invasive Carp Project Funds

LANSING, MI — Midwest governors and Congressional delegates are advocating for funding to speed along the fortification of a chokepoint lock and dam near Chicago that would become the last line of defense against invasive carp reaching the Great Lakes when completed.

On Dec. 10, the governors of Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, New York, Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota and Pennsylvania sent a letter asking Congress to put roughly \$10 million toward the Brandon Road Lock & Dam reconstruction in the 2022 Water Resources Reform and Development Act.

Democratic Sens. Gary Peters and Debbie Stabenow of Michigan issued a similar letter to President Joe Biden last week urging engineering and design


work for the project be included among federal projects implemented through the recent \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill.

The estimated \$858 million project has been in planning stages for years. Advance design and engineering work took a leap forward this year when \$3.8

Pre-construction is expected to cost \$29 million. About 35 percent of that has already been provided. Michigan previously pledged \$8 million and Illinois \$10.5 million.

The work is expected to last three-to-four years.

"However, the balance of project cost for design, construction, operation and maintenance is beyond the capacity of the Great Lakes

million for it was included in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers fiscal 2021 work plan. States to match. Therefore, we request that United States federal government address this project consis-

tent with how other largescale projects have been funded that similarly have a strong bearing on the regional and national economy," the eight governors wrote last week.

The gauntlet-style fortification project is located on the Des Plaines River near Joliet, Ill. It would reconfigure the Brandon Road lock with fortifications to hamper invasive silver and bighead carp from moving upstream, such as an electric barrier, bubble barrier, acoustic deterrents and flushing lock. The upgrades are meant to reduce the chances fish could slip through while still allowing barge traffic to pass.

Conflicting interests of barge operators and the Great Lakes fishing and boating industries have been at the heart of disagreements over how to address the invasive fish species as they advance through Illinois waters. The population bulk is about 50 miles from Lake Michigan, although genetic material and individual fish have

been found much closer.

Conservation groups say the fish could have a major disruptive impact on sport fishing and recreational boating in the Great Lakes. Silver carp could injure people by leaping from the water when disturbed

and both species would likely compete with native fish for food and habitat.

The Great Lakes fishing industry is valued at \$7 billion.

This summer, government agencies and councils coordinating efforts to battle the invasive fish said they would stop applying the long-used label "Asian carp" to invasive silver, bighead, grass and black carps out of concern it could cast Asian culture in a negative light.

organization. I can count all the new ones I've seen in my career on one hand. There are also organizations that are disappearing and that is not good for having the voice of the angling community heard by those of us who are managing the resources. Get some young folks into your organization and expand. MCBA represents about a third to a half of the charter captains (MSSFA about 10% of the salmon and steelhead fishers). There is some band width there to attract some more members."

Chief Dexter is right on in his assessment of the most critical issue facing associations trying to provide sportsmen and women the best possible experience. We have 2.1 million licensed fishers in Michigan and approximately 200,000 out of state fishers that come into Michigan to fish its waters. A minuscule number belong to associations that promote sport fishing. Not only do we have a responsibility to protect the fishery, we need to promote and enhance the fishery which requires a collective voice in Lansing. We need more of those fishers to join our ranks and provide the voice we need. This holiday why not give a fisher in your circle of family and friends a membership to MSSFA. Your nephew, brother-in-law, or neighbor will be pleased you thought of them and the fate of our sport fishery as well.

An order to extend the Great Lakes Fishing Consent Decree through June 30, 2022 was granted on November 29th. The Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, and the State of Michigan joined in this motion While the Sault Ste. Marie

tribe of Chippewa Indians' counsel originally indicated that his clients opposed an extension of the Decree, they have reconsidered, and they did not oppose the motion to extend the Decree. The Bay Mills Indian Community did not take a position on this motion.

In 1979, the Court affirmed the existence of an off-reservation fishing right

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in the portions of the great Lakes ceded to the United States in the 1836 Treaty of Washington. (From approximately Alpena, MI around the top of the lower peninsula to Grand Haven, MI.) For the past 20 years, the 2000 great lakes Fishing Decree has provided the governing framework for fishing in the 1836 Treaty waters. But the Decree is set to expire on August 8, 2020, and when it expires, there will be no governing framework in place to pro-

tect the rights of the parties.

The parties originally began negotiating the terms of the successor decree in September 2019. Due to the difficulty of negotiating during the COVID-19 pandemic, negotiations proceeded slowly. Consequently, the Court extended the expiration date of the Decree to December 31, 2020. When the negotiations still did not result in a successor decree, the Court extended the Decree twice more. The Decree is now set to expire on June 30,

MSSFA is has been involved in protecting sport fishing since the very beginning of the first Consent Decree in 1985. We continue advocating for the sport fisherman today by participating as a principal member of the Citizens to Protect Michigan's Resources (CPMR) whose attorneys are present at the negotia-

tion's table as amicus curiae representatives (friend of the court). Our opinions on the terms being discussed are solicited by the state and the federal representatives when terms which impact sport fishing are being considered. We continue to advocate for the tribes to exercise restraint and preserve regulations that share the resource of lake trout equally with sport fishers, limit gear used to trap nets and retain the fishing zones that have guaranteed each tribe exclusive access to their territorial waters.

The Natural Resources Commission meeting on the December 9th resulted in the passage of two amendments (to the Fishery Order; FO 200.22) which would add exceptions for establishing a daily possession limit of one (1) rainbow trout during the spawning period of March 15 through May 15th on several rivers.

The amendment has a sunset provision and we will continue to monitor the effects of this action on fishing opportunity. A second amendment sponsored by Commissioner Cozad will allow for harvest of Walleye during the typically closed season in the spring on the Lower Saginaw River and will also remove the current gear restrictions for that same stretch of river. The effective date for this amendment was amended during the NRC meeting and will be Jan. 1, 2023 so it will not influence fishing/ harvest opportunities this upcoming spring.

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

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Why Throw Lures for Steelhead

I felt a strange tap as my spinner swept by the huge submerged boulder but was about ready to dismiss it as the blade bumping the rock when a steelie tried to take the rod out of my hand. Obviously the fish had made a pass at the shiny lure, then got it in its sights again and really crushed the irritating silver object. Instantly the steelhead ripped off a long run straight down stream over a coffer dam and I knew right away I needed to get to shore to get around and below the low head dam. But by the time I cleared the coffer dam there was almost no line on my reel. Slowly line was put back on the spool but mostly because I was wading toward the fish.

Every time I tried to pressure the fish upstream it would jump and tear away in the opposite direction. Soon the next coffer dam loomed and I defi-

nitely didn't want the fish to go over it as well. The steelie got its way however and I was now scrambling to shore again, the opposite one from the side I circumvented the first coffer. Made it again without getting spooled and finally got below the fish and corralled it in my net. I was pretty sure I was more tired than the steelhead was after the half mile chase in downtown Grand Rapids.

As a group, steelheaders who cast and retrieve spoons and weighted spinners make up a tiny minority of those that chase these magnificent fish. Drift fishing in its many forms is far and way the most popular method and I am certain there are also more plug pullers and fly anglers fishing for steelhead. One reason drift fishing is at the top of the list is that it is so effective.

The ultimate Steelheader is a very versatile and applies different methods

at different times and conditions. This writer is the epitome of the NON versatile angler in that well over 99% of the steelies I've landed have had a weighted spinner or a minnow plug in their mouth. .

In this article I am going to try to relate why I think tossing lures is such a fun way to catch steelhead. It also becomes pretty effective once you get the hang of the subtleties. Comparisons will be made to the other techniques and a few thoughts on how to make one more successful with all methods will be sprinkled in as we go. At times it may seem like I'm putting down another method when comparing facets but that is not the intent. I'm just trying to emphasize the special positives of throwing lures. The vast majority of my experience has been with spinners and plugs rather than spoons because they work better in the slower flows of the Great Lakes tributaries. In the stronger flows of the Northwest, especially in the winter, spoons are often the first choice. Everything I say about spinners in this article also applies to spoons.

One of my favorite things about hardware tossing is that it is such a "hands on", active way to fish. You are always in the process of casting and retrieving and then guiding and feeling your spinner through the holding water. Drift fishing is similar except that the current is presenting the offering and you rarely cover as much ground. When side drifting in a boat the oars man or motor operator is doing all the fishing and the angler is just manning the rod. The same is true for plug pulling from a boat. Because you are not completely at the mercy of the current when you are casting and retrieving you can fish lots of snaggy holding water and other nooks and crannies that the drift angler can't.

It follows that casting accuracy is very important in lure tossing and luckily compact weighted spinners and spoons are the easiest to learn to cast to the spot. There is no "helicoptering" of the bait or lure and the sinker like there is when drift fishing. Once you add a float the casting gets even more difficult for the drift angler, especially when you are employing a center pin reel. Flipping spinners into tight places is lots of fun and helps you show your lure to more fish. This is important since most of the time steelhead would rather pick up eggs than hit a flashy lure if given the

One of the neatest parts of steelhead fishing is the take and the subsequent response of the fish when you set the hook. It is often said

Open water trolling is a technique that many anglers employ. Instead of dropping an anchor and fishing from a stationary position, they keep the outboard or electric motor in gear and slowly keep moving. Trolling on the ice may sound like an unusual or even impossible task, but it's a technique that many ice-anglers have become familiar with. Once you put the concept into action, trolling on the ice will become a big part of your ice-fishing arsenal.

Trolling on the ice is an effective way to chase walleyes, perch, crappies, and pretty much any other fish that swims under the ice. It seems to be most productive after the ice has been on the lake for a few weeks. Early in the season when the ice is thin, clear, and probably not covered with much snow, it usually works better to keep movement and noise to a minimum to prevent spooking the fish. When the ice thickens and gets some snow on it, that's when we'll start trolling.

Wherever you fish, much of the time most of the fish will be gathered in

fairly small areas. Trolling will speed up the fish finding process, and that will enable you to put a bait in front of more fish more often. The more fish that see your bait, usually the more fish you'll catch.

Sonar and GPS/mapping will enable an angler to troll on the ice most effectively. The GPS/mapping is helpful and will get you started in the right area faster, but the sonar is a must-have piece of equipment. Sonar will reveal the depth also, and by drilling several holes and then employing the sonar, you can learn about the structure below. Most important though, the sonar will show if fish are in the area.

To get started, locate the area where you think there should be some fish. Next, drill holes. This can be a good two person task. One person drill, the other person clean the hole out and check the depth. Try to cover different depths in the drilling process. Now we start trolling. Select a hole to start at, put the transducer for your sonar in the hole, drop a bait to the bottom, and watch for fish life. If you don't see some-

reel up and troll to the next hole. Some anglers will give a hole a couple of minutes, others are more patient and maybe give a hole five minutes. Many of these hole-hopping anglers aren't real patient when it comes to waiting for a fish to show up on the sonar. They would rather go looking for a hole with fish underneath instead of waiting for the fish to come to the hole that they're fishing.

Many ice anglers have a shelter for trolling on the ice. These shelters are the ice fishing version of a boat. They're portable and make it easy to troll from hole to hole. Clam has been creating shelters for ice fishing for about 40 years and are the pioneers in portable ice shelters. They provide protection from the elements, they're comfortable to fish from, and they also serve well when moving from hole to hole. An angler can put a sonar unit, auger, rods and tackle in the shelter and simply pull it, or troll, to the next hole in the ice.

Ice fishing gear is getting lighter all time, and this makes trolling on the ice even easier. Vexilar has

thing within a few minutes, a new unit, the FLX-30BB, that uses a lithium battery. The battery is much lighter and lasts much longer than the batteries that we're accustomed to. K-Drill au-


gers get their power from move from hole to hole. an electric drill, so they're lighter in weight and there's no gas and oil to mix. This lighter weight equipment makes it much easier to

If you want to catch more fish this winter, try trolling on ice. Once you do, you'll see why this approach is so effective.

that feeling the throbbing head shakes of a newly hooked steelhead through a sensitive graphite rod is at least the second greatest feeling a steelheader can experience. When you combine that with a savage strike like that described at the beginning of this article, it is no wonder we are obsessed with this wonderful fish. Lure tossers do get more than their share of hard strikes but the subtle hits are also intriguing and keep you on your toes. Often the light tap described above is followed by a slight, but weighty drag. Time to set hook for sure!





An Invitation to the METRO-WEST STEELHEADERS

MWS also participates with MUCC and other conservation groups in three annual river clean ups on the Clinton and Manistee Rivers.

tests. There are also "Big Fish" and "Warm Water Challenge" annual fishing contests.



Spring Fever for Steelhead

If you were to ask me what my favorite seasons are? I would undoubtedly say Fall and Winter. But after the lonely Dead feeling of a long cold Winter comes a time of new. Springtime arrives and gives birth to a new world of beauty and new life.

For many anglers, Springtime means spring fishing for Steelhead. These fish enter their spawning streams starting in Late September to early May. However, many of these early Fall run fish will winter over, waiting for Spring. Usually, the early fish will begin spawning in March, followed by more Spring run fish in April, and is generally over by May.

Most of these fish will reach sexual maturity in 2 to 3 years while in the Big Lake before returning to the river to spawn. So, Springtime means big fun with screaming drags and bent rods for the Mighty Steelhead. Let's talk about some tips to make you more successful this Spring.

Finding Fish

Finding and catching Spring Steelhead isn't too difficult this time of year. Most fish are holding in gravel areas with faster flows. If it's still early yet, look for pools near the spawning gravel. They should be there waiting. Some tips on fish locations within the river system depend on the Spring weath-

When we have cold Springs, the larger adult females tend to hold and hang down low in the system near gravel. If the cold weather stays many times, they will stop at the closet gravel, spawn and leave. Another tip is on a frigid Spring year, look for huge pushes of fish to show up in May instead of April. In warm spring years, look in the mid and upper portions of the river for the largest concentrations of fish. Photo light periods affect their movements but so do water temps and rains.

Float Control

When you arrive at a run to fish, you must slow your roll and take a look at what's going on at that spot today. Sometimes the fish will give away their locations as they are constantly jockeying around the hole or running for a good position. Once that seam, bubble line, piece of cover, or broken water has been located. The angler must methodically pick that run apart and fish it well.

The beauty of fishing a float; the offering can be put right in the zone. How this works is through depth and controlling the float. That rod is a tool not only to help set the hook, tire the fish out and help you land the fish. But it is the steering wheel for the float. Moving the rod left or right

or up or down enables you to guide the float and bait offering to its desired location. In cold water temps where fishing is a game of inches, accurate float control catches more fish.

When delivering the presentation, you must have a laser focus on that float. Concentrating on the float and learning to look for subtle strikes. and understanding a bite or a rock is crucial. Sometimes a strike looks like you snagged the bottom of the fish mouth the bait. Always set the hook, or you could be sorry. I'm speaking from experience, trust me.

Baits to Try

This time of year, it's hard to beat a spawn bag or Bead. My favorite Spawn bag colors in the Spring would be various shades of pink, chartreuse, peach, orange, and white.

I love to fish beads with a small light wire hook. Find yourself some microbeads in sizes 4 or 5 mm in natural colors that can also be deadly. Think translucent colors. This technique can be dirty good in the Spring! You're matching the hatch, so to speak, with all those Small Steelhead eggs floating in the river.

A small pink worm cut down to 2-1/2 inches can also be dynamite on Steelhead. For whatever reason, most fishermen in the Great Lakes Region don't use too many rubber

Spinners, minnow plugs and spoons have a feel to them as they move through the water. It is very important to use a sensitive rod and get attuned to that subtle resistance to the flow. Sometimes the steelhead will just inhale the spinner and swim with it so that all you feel is slightly less resistance. As western writer Bill Herzog has eloquently described several times in his articles, these fish also can actually grab and come toward you with the lurethe slack line take.

More and more drift anglers and fly fishermen are using floats and strike indicators when fishing for steelhead. Now you only need your eyes to detect the strike. The floats provide a superior presentation in most cases and you will certainly be hung up less. I think many traditional drift anglers keep presenting their bait or lure without a float because they are good at it and really enjoy the satisfaction of detecting the delicate pick up of a steelhead. Float anglers

have shown that keeping their offering a foot or two off the gravel is frequently more effective and conventional drifters can increase their success and decrease their downtime re-rigging after hang-ups by using less weight and drifting higher.

Another plus for fishing spoons, plugs and spinners for steelhead is that they tend to catch larger fish. A case can be made for the possibility that larger steelhead are more territorial. They were that way as they grew into smolts in the river, enabling them to be a bit larger before they headed for the ocean or Great Lake. They then used their larger size for a better start in the big water. Another reason for the larger average size on spoons & spinners may be that small steelhead, especially half pounders/ skippers, are more likely to feed on their migration and thus eggs are especially effective for them. I know for sure that I can't compete with egg fishermen in the early fall for skippers in Michigan.

A better fight, on average, seems to be another positive about invading a Mature male steelhead


steelhead's territory with shiny metal or a gaudy plug. In response to the hard hook set the steelhead seems to say, "Okay if you want to play rough, we'll play rough". The dangling lure from their jaw seems to be quite irritating causing them go airborne a lot and really pull hard. It may be that stronger force applied by the stiffer rod and heavier line panics them a bit. Fishing on a winter day recently, a steelhead softly took my spinner in 32.5 degree water. I set the hook hard and the dark fish immediately put three

feet of air between it and the river surface. It raced downstream and duplicated the first jump when I tried to slow it down. A spinner definitely brought the best out of a dark, egg laden hen that had probably been in the river for three months.

caught on a spinner bait.

The final reason I love to lure fish is the simplicity. No leaders, swivels, sinkers, bait, yarn, or floats, I just hang a lure on my snap and start casting. Your only challenge is to pick a size and blade finish that gets the steelhead's attention and aggravates it into striking instead of being ignored because they don't see it or spooked because it is too large and bright for conditions.

When drift fishing that "never fail" run doesn't produce try clipping off your terminal rig and tying on a spinner and fluttering it through the holding water. Better yet, use a duolock snap on the end of your mainline to your drift rig and eliminate any cutting and retying. Be careful though, lure tossing can be addictive.







COLOR FOR OPEN WATER AND ICE

The color of a lure for fishing is one of the most popular topics of conversation among anglers who fish through the ice or in open water. To some anglers, lure color isn't that important. To other anglers, color is very important. To the most successful anglers, lure color is one of several considerations. In a good number of situations, whether it be open-water or ice-fishing, the color of your lure can affect how many fish you catch.

It's especially obvious while ice-fishing that color is important. When we're on the ice, we keep a very close eye on the screen of our depth-finder. It will show you everything that is going on directly below that hole. If a fish comes in and looks at your bait but doesn't eat it, you see it. If they look several times but don't eat, something needs to be changed. One of the things that should be considered for change is color. There are times when fish are very color conscious. Following are some ideas on color that apply to open water and ice-fishing.

The general rule-ofthumb that many successful anglers use when selecting a lure is to go with a bright bait when there is only a foot or two of clarity in the water. Orange or chartreuse lures are popular. And you can't go wrong by starting with a glow color in stained water.

When you can see more than a couple of feet in the water, life-like colors are sometimes better. Not always, but sometimes. Some anglers like a bait that resembles the primary forage fish in the body of water being fished. Other anglers reach for a lure

doesn't resemble anything that's ever been alive in that body of water. They think that if the predator fish are seeing and eating the same thing all the time, something that looks completely different will be more appealing. Give them something different and they're more likely to eat

Color can be especially important in ice-fishing. Fish can really study a bait when you're ice-fishing. The bait is only going up and down, and usually pretty slowly. In open water, if you're casting or trolling, the bait is moving, and often pretty fast. The fish in

it. Several decades of fishing experience has taught me that sometimes in clear water fish like natural looking baits and sometimes they like baits that don't look natural. Keep trying different colors until the fish show you what color

open water need to respond quickly. Under the ice, they can take their time, and if that bait isn't exactly what they want, they don't eat it. Lure action and size certainly make a difference, but so does color.

When it comes to figur-

ing out what color to start with, there isn't really a right or wrong way to go about it. Some anglers start with what worked for them most recently. Others use the water clarity concept: Clear water, natural colors. Stained water, bright colors. Drop Jigs have become a go-to for many ice anglers. They're made of tungsten so they're tiny. Because they're so small,

some anglers like to go with a bright color regardless of water clarity. They feel that because of the tiny size of the jig, the brighter color will help the fish find the bait easier. I don't know if that's the way it really works, but I do know that many of the anglers who go with that theory catch a lot

Some folks believe that the only reason baits are of-

fered in different colors is so the lure-makers can sell more lures. The truth is, if that color doesn't catch fish, it won't be around very long. Next time you go fishing and aren't getting bit as often as you would like, try a different color. Sometimes color will be the difference between catching a few and catching a bunch.



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



Will the Ludington Offshore Classic See Another Record Breaker?

Annual Tournament Returns to Ludington Harbor July 11-17

In 2021, the Port of Ludington became a Great Lakes record breaker when a first-time fisherman, Luis, reeled in a 47-pound King Salmon aboard an Icebreaker Charters vessel. Ludington was already on the map as a fishing destination -- but this monster brought a lot of attention to the freshwater harbor town.

Fishing off the coast of Ludington has long been a pursued pastime among anglers, and 2022 will be no exception. The Ludington Offshore Classic Fishing Tournament will return to the acclaimed salmon and trout port on July 11-17, and tournament organizers are already planning another stellar event at Waterfront Park.

Make plans now to gather your crew and sign up when registration opens on April 1.

2021 Recap

Last year's Ludington Offshore Classic saw over \$86,000 in cash and prizes awarded among the top fishermen. While Thursday's Ruboy Classic event was cancelled due to inclement weather, the remainder

of the tournament went off without a hitch, starting with the Big Boys event on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Elsie K was the big winner, taking home a nice check for \$23,800. On Day 1, the crew brought in 11 fish for a total of 95 pounds, while Day 2 was even better with 12 fish for a total of 134.5 pounds.

"It was definitely a good payout for sure," said Elsie K captain, Gabe Graham. "This was our third win this summer with one coming in Wilson, New York at the Wilson Harbor Invitational on Lake Ontario and another in Manistee at the Budweiser Pro/Am. It is definitely a rush to win against some of the best captains on the lake. Ludington is a great place to fish and a great town. It's a very wellrun tournament and great payouts."

Blue Fairways, a wellknown name at the Ludington harbor, was the top boat in the Offshore Classic Pro Division, which earned it a \$10,000 prize. This crew reeled in an impressive 12 fish on Day 1 for a 159.9-pound box, and 12 fish on Day 2 for a 188.55-pound box.

"Leading up to the tournament, Blue Fairways had fished several places the prior week, and by the time the Big Boys started, we had decided to fish south of Ludington," said Greg Magee of the Blue Fairways crew. "We were blessed that each and every day, fishing was better than the prior day.'

On Day 1, they had caught several nice mature kings, one which weighed 30 pounds (taking second-place Big Fish). After bagging some trout and another good-sized king, Blue Fairways was in third place at the end of the day.

"Day 2 left us no option but to go back south," Magee added. "After an hour of fishing, we had one small king and one small trout - and then bang - we hit a double then a triple and another double boating all seven fish, most of the mature variety.

"To win a tournament one needs to fish great but also have some luck. The team put an amazing program together, and we continued to hit fish all day - having one of those epic second days all tournament fishermen dream of."

This win was extra special, since Blue Fairways had previously won the women's tournament, youth tournament, Ruboy Thursday and Big Boys,

but had only finished in 2nd place three times in the Offshore Classic before their 2021 win.

'We felt very fortunate and blessed to win against the strongest field of fishermen on Lake Michigan," said Magee.

worms? The action of the tail on those worms drives Steelies nuts some days. The ones that have discovered how good the pink rubber worm can be don't talk about it much. Also, try a nightcrawler sometimes; it will outfish any other spring bait. Lots of crawlers are being washed into the river this time of year.

A small salad shrimp can be deadly on fresh fish in the Spring, especially if the fish are Spawned out and dropping back to the Lake. Also, crawfish and minnows can be dynamite on Steelhead in the Spring.

Why some are more successful

Have you ever noticed that some anglers catch more fish with ease, while others may fish hard, do all the "right things," but still not catch as many fish? Equipment, rigging, and timing could be the reasons why? But most of these examples can easily be fixed, remedied, or learned.

An angler can learn these things Via the internet, going to a seminar, reading an article, or spending the day with a guide. For some, they have done all the above and still struggle. Nothing is better than time on the water. The more days you fish, the more you learn.

In my opinion, reading water and finding the fish is the biggest reason why. It can take many years on the river to master this skill. The Steelhead aren't called the fish of a thousand casts because they are easy to

Steelhead fishing has lots of competition regarding things to do in the Spring. This competition includes Walleye Jigging, Mushroom Hunting, Turkey Hunting, and others. But make no mistake about it you will be glad you did.



105-Pound River's **Inlet King**

History was made off the British Columbia coast last August, when a lady angler landed what is perhaps the largest Chinook salmon ever hooked on sport gear—a fish in the mythical 100-plus-pound class!

Gayle Gordon and her husband John were fishing near Dawson's Landing in the fabled River's Inlet area (in their own boat which they had dragged and ferried from their home Duncan, B.C.) when the monster struck.

As you can imagine, there aren't a whole lot of fiberglass replica blanks of 105-pound kings laying around, so they had to make a custom mold for Gayle's

"It was my turn to run the rods while John ran the boat," says Gordon. "We were mooching cut-plug herring down about 25 feet, and when the fish bit, the head-shakes were so violent, so strong. Up there because of the water color, you can't see the fish until they break the surface but I knew that this was something unbelievable!"

And the Gordons know a thing or two about hooking big kings. They started fishing together 35 years ago on their first date and have been hard at it every year since then. They've caught and released 13 Chinook over 50 pounds at River's Inlet, including three in the 60's, two in the 70's, an 82.43 pounder and one just under 85 pounds!

Gayle says that the fish she hooked in August was in an entirely different class than any of their previous giants. She fought the fish on her Temple Fork rod and Islander MR2 "knuckle buster" mooching reel for 45 minutes before getting a look at it. During that time, a crowd of boats gathered around to watch the action.

"The people up there are so awesome and very courteous," she says. "Basically, the whole fleet saw us catch it. They made a circle around us and watchedand when we got it, they went nuts."

Gayle says she still doesn't have words to describe what she was feeling when the behemoth finally came to the net.

"He was

chrome and not a mark on him," she says. "What an amazing, amazing fish!"

The Gordons scrambled to get some measurements on the fish-and they did so three times just to make sure they got it right and then posed for a couple quick photos which were taken by boats floating around them. In short order, the estimated 7-year-old monster was back in the water and swimming free.


Now, here's where things get really interesting. The king taped out at a whopping 55 inches (an inch longer than the bottom width on my first drift boat) and had a mind blowing 38-inch girth! Because they let the fish go, the Gordon's don't have an official weight on their salmon but they put it into the ol' tried and true 750 weight formula (Weight = Length x Girth)x Girth /750) and it came out to 105.9 pounds!

Now, obviously weight formulas have some wiggle room as far as results go because fish come in all different shapes and sizes, so I decided to run it through some other ones just for

The first one I tried was the Steelhead/Salmon Weight Calculator on www.piscatorialpursuits. com. I'm not sure what the formula is that they use, but when I punched the measurements in, the big king came out at 102.4 pounds. On the Ally Mc-Gowan Formula, used for Atlantic salmon (found on www.wherewisemenfish. com), 55x38 gets you 120.5 pounds! I also found a calculator at http://www.csgnetwork.com/ (not sure of their formula) but the king came out to 122.1 pounds.

Sometimes, folks also use the 800 formula (which is the same as above, just divided by 800 instead of 750) but I think that one is designed more for fish like trout and steelhead and doesn't really well represent the girth of Gayle's king. Even underestimated with this method, her fish comes out at an incredible 99.28 pounds.

Okay, so now let's take a look at how Gayle's Chinook measures up to fish with known weights. Les Anderson's IGFA All-Tackle World Record king from the Kenai River in Alasbrilliant ka weighed 97 pounds, 4



ly caught. In August of 2001, a massive king was caught and released on the Skeena River in B.C. by clients fishing out of Kermode Bear Fishing Lodge in Terrace, BC. That leviathan measured 53.5 x 38.5, which comes out to 105.7 pounds on the 750 formula above (and 99 and change using the 800 formula).

Obviously, we'll never know the precise weight of Gayle's fish but it's safe to say that it was clearly over 100 pounds, which just boggles the mind. A pound here or there in either direction really doesn't matter—

the real story is she caught a fish that would, almost certainly, be the new all-tackle world record, but she decided to forgo the glory and release it instead! In this day and age of declining Chinook stocks—especially the true giants—it was truly

"The culture is changing up there at River's Inlet," she says. "Lots and lots of boats are measuring and releasing their big fish now which is great. Really the only way to get IGFA to recognize our fish as a true record was to kill it and I didn't want to do that. I'm just so humbled to have been able to catch him. It was so cool!"

Sadly, doing a hero shot on board is a tall order with a fish of that size when you're not keeping it, so the Gordon's don't have any good photos of their amazing catch. There are several shots taken from other boats, but they don't do much justice to this king of kings. What does do it plenty of justice, however, is the fabulous mount that Advanced Taxidermy made of it. As you can imagine, there aren't a whole lot of

fiberglass replica blanks of 105-pound kings laying around, so they had to make a custom mold for Gayle's

"It's absolutely amazing.... Advanced really nailed it," she says. "I feel so blessed-we were obviously fishing for big fish up there but I never dreamed of getting one that size! I caught the fish, but it really was a team effort with my husband John. After that, I gave him the next three chances on the rods in a

The Gordon's obviously didn't need any more inspiration to return to River's Inlet next year, but just to remind them that there are potentially even bigger kings to be caught, owners Rob and Nola Bachen dusted off and showed them the mount of a 126-pound king they had in storage. The enormous king was caught by a commercial boat back in the 1960's "It was truly an honor to see that fish," she says.
